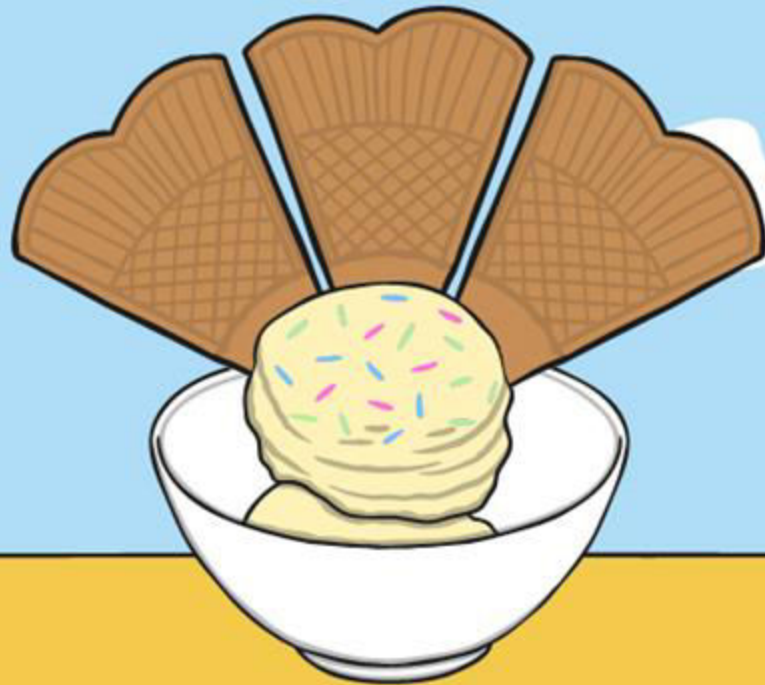

Joining Sentences



Every sentence has a clause.

A clause is a group of words that has a subject and a verb.

Jessica ran to the shop.



The subject



The verb



Joining Sentences



When we join two clauses together, they become complex or compound sentences. We already know at least one way to do this – by using **and**

Jessica ran to the shop **and** she bought a chocolate bar.

We join our clauses together using conjunctions.

The word **and** is a conjunction.



Joining Sentences



We often want to join our clauses together to make our writing more interesting to read. When we do this we use conjunctions.

When we are joining two clauses that are as important as each other and that could be individual sentences, we use a **co-ordinating conjunction**.

There are many **co-ordinating conjunctions** but we are going to look more carefully at three of them:

and

but

or

Each of these **co-ordinating conjunctions** has a different job.

and

is used when we are adding more information to a sentence.

but

is used when we are contrasting things.

or

is used when we are writing about alternatives.

Joining Sentences



and

but

or

Remember that when we use these conjunctions, the clauses they join could stand on their own and still make sense.

Look at the sentence below.

I really wanted chocolate ~~but~~ my mum said no.

If we take the word **but** out of this sentence and replace it with a full stop, it still makes sense.
