A New Baby

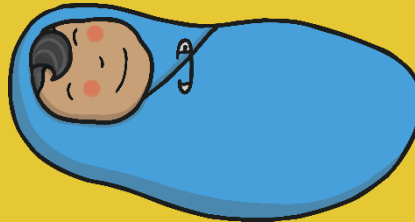


People often visit a new baby and sometimes give cards or presents to welcome the baby.



Ceremonies are sometimes held to welcome new babies.

Hindus have many ceremonies for new babies, including Namakarana, which is a naming ceremony.



Christians name and baptise babies in christening ceremonies and sometimes hold dedication ceremonies to welcome new babies.



In this lesson, we will be learning about a Muslim ceremony to welcome a new baby. This ceremony is called Aqiqah.

A Baby Is Born



When a baby is first born in a Muslim family, the first thing the baby hears is the call to prayer. This is whispered into the baby's right ear. Anyone can whisper this to the child but it is usually the baby's father.



The first taste experienced by the newborn baby is some sweet liquid (such as date juice) put into the mouth. This is so that the baby grows up to have a sweet nature.

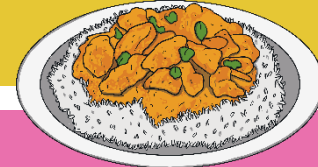


Aqiqah

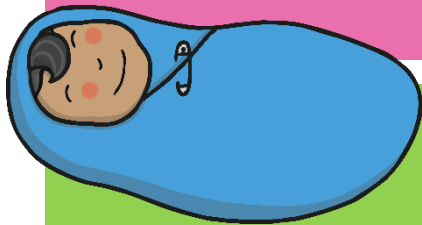


In the Islamic faith, Muslims welcome babies in a ceremony called the Aqiqah (pronounced Ak-kee-ka).

This is when the baby is introduced to family and friends. They celebrate and share a meal together. They join with loved ones to thank Allah (God) for giving them a child.



The Aqiqah is hosted by the parents of the new baby and may be held in their own home or in a hall or community centre.



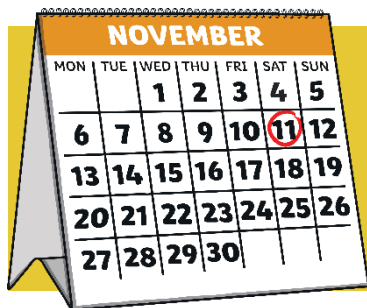

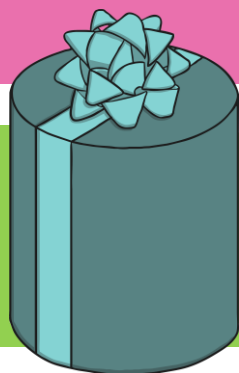


The Aqiqah is usually held on the seventh day after the baby is born.



If this is not possible, it might be held on the 14th or the 21st day after the baby's birth.

Guests often bring along cards and gifts for the baby. The hall or home where the Aqiqah is held may be decorated with balloons and other decorations.

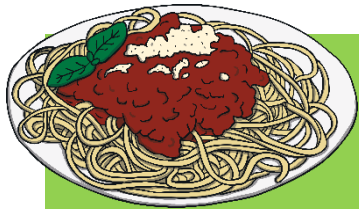

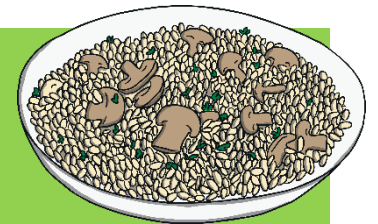
A meal is enjoyed by everyone at the celebration.

Traditionally, a family would sacrifice an animal, such as a sheep or goat, and give some of the meat to poor people.

In Britain today, Muslims usually order the meat from caterers or butchers for the party and give money to charities who feed poor people.



What would you eat at a celebration feast?

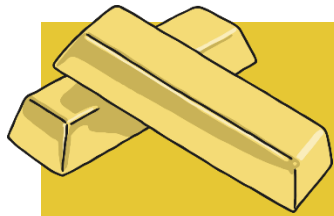




Aqiqah



An important part of the Aqiqah is when the baby's hair is cut or shaved off. Prayers are said for the baby.



The removed hair is weighed and this weight in gold or silver is given to charity.

It is at the moment when the hair is cut that the baby's name is announced but Aqiqah is not specifically a naming ceremony.

Aqiqah Values



An important part of the Aqiqah ceremony is when the baby's hair is cut and weighed. The weight of the baby's hair is used to work out a donation or gift to give to charity.

Giving to charity is an important part of the Muslim faith.
