



Introducing Sadio Mané




- He has spent thousands of pounds building a hospital, mosque, football Helping Others to Grow
- He donated money to help the Senegalese health authorities cope with the coronavirus outbreak, as well as equipping children in his village with their own football kit and giving every family money to help them
- "My father died because there was no hospital in the village, so I decided
- Known for his kindness and down-to-earth attitude, he's been spotted helping to unload crates of water bottles from his team's bus, treated unsuspecting fans and ball boys with gifts and instead of celebrating after winning a big game, was seen scrubbing toilets at his local
- His attitude towards luxury things is also unusual for someone so wealthy. After being photographed with a cracked iPhone, Sadio Mané said:
- "Why would I want ten Ferraris, 20 diamond watches, or two planes? What will these objects do for me and for the world? I was hungry, and I had to work in the field; I survived hard times, played football barefooted, I did not have an education and many other things, but today with what I earn thanks to football, I can help my people."




Using your Roots to Grow
